Roller coaster weather has been the norm this spring. Beautiful spring temperatures during the week and snow on the weekend or vice versa. Cabin fever has been more prevalent for most of us than the corona virus. With many of our favorite restaurants and all our usual watering holes closed, the number of destinations for a ride is limited.

The second Sunday in March was prior to the corona virus restrictions. The day was not terribly cold, and a small group of Sunflower members met at Twisted Oz Museum for a ride to the monthly biker breakfast at Potwin Kansas.

Although it made it to 70 that afternoon the morning started in the mid 40's. With a nice tail wind out of the south and the sun shining on us, the 25 mile ride was not too bad. We arrived early, as it turns out a month early, for the first scheduled breakfast in April and that one was ended up canceled. A few other folks were there, they too were disappointed that breakfast was not being served.

Our group of 8 included Jerry Ottaway on a 1932 R2 BMW single cylinder, Kelly Modlin riding a 1928 Cleveland four-cylinder, Collin Else on a 1955 Ariel 350 NH which he has owned since he was 16. There was a gab session, with the other bikers, about the weather, bikes, and no breakfast, before we headed out to find something to eat. The ride back to Augusta was not as pleasurable, although the temperature was warming up, the 40 mph plus wind made it feel colder. Jerry on that little BMW was having trouble keeping up his speed. The wind would force him to down shift to make over the gentle hills. We made it back and pulled into McDonalds for breakfast and a warmup.

Later that afternoon I headed back home in Wichita. It had warmed up to 70 but there was a 90° crosswind gusting 35 to 50 mph and I was using up all my lane to stay upright. Wind in Kansas? Yeah, we have some days without it.







March 29th two weeks later, after a couple more rides on the weather roller coaster, Sunday had the looks of a good day for a ride. Due to the corona virus, there were local nonessential business closings and social distancing orders. They had been in affect for a few days, but it seemed to me we could have a group ride and abide by the rules.

There were five us who showed up at the Museum and determined that we would need that essential hydrocarbon, gasoline, if we were to ride to Cottonwood Falls. We agreed to maintain the 6-foot social distancing.



Dick Chance, Gram Pankratz, Steve Spencer, Neil Havran, and myself, set out on a familiar ride over to Eldorado and around the lake, then onto the famous biker gathering point of Cassoday. Only 2 bikers there, as this was not the 1st Sunday of the month. We continued north on KS177 along the Flint Hills Scenic Byway. The morning was calm by Kansas standard and you could see that ranchers were taking advantage, because on the horizon, the sky was hazy with gray smoke. We had passed several areas where the prairie had been burned off to promote healthy grassland.

At Cottonwood Falls we stopped at Casey's General Store for gas and drinks. There had been only a couple of other bikes on the road that morning, but a couple of local bikes passed through while we were stopped. Dick split off from us and we set out to return on the same route. As we road back on KS177 I noticed that Steve was falling back and figured he was just making his own pace. At the top of one hill I could see back down the highway about a mile and didn't see Steve. I pulled over with Neil and waited a couple of minutes before we turned around. We went about a mile and Steve rode up, pointing to his left foot. He explained the shift lever was loose on the shift shaft and he was

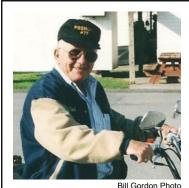




having trouble shifting. We were stopped on the shoulder assessing the problem when Neil walked down into the ditch and came back up with a Michelob Ultra can. I thought this was an odd time to be concerned about roadside litter, but Neil had a plan to fix Steve's problem. A few minutes later Neil had fashioned a shim out a piece of the aluminum can and the shifter was secured. We continued to Wichita riding into a stiff south wind and passed several other groups of riders enjoying the day. Everyone made it home safe and sound.

Sometimes the tables are turned, even for the cleverest tricksters. This prank happened at Colorado Springs during an early D.J. Run. My friend's wife ordered a ring from Charles, who operated a fine jewelry store there. She asked for a huge CZ stone mounted in a flashy setting that would look like a million bucks! And she wanted all of this for a reasonable price. Charles came up with a beautiful

sparkler, and the price was only 80 bucks! While our group was waiting for some hot food at the Flying W Ranch, she unveiled this ring. What a ring it was! Catching all those rays of the setting sun, the ring shone like a locomotive headlight. That stone was big enough to pound nails with. My friend had trouble accepting the altered bill, which now read "eighty THOUSAND dollars". He almost fell through the floor before going into a low orbit. It took a few minutes to get him settled down to explain the joke to him. Then, all was okay once more. But I would bet that the entire incident shortened his life span by at least 60 days. The Omaha Chapter hosts the first national meet of the year, the Lincoln Highway National, and every year is held in Fremont Nebraska. In the dead of winter, it's a great event to swap parts and stories with friends and others who share the common hobby. It is also notorious for the winter weather that always seems to accompany the meet. This year however the weather was very nice. The vendors always bring a cache of parts to show at the first meet of the year and there are bikes that are fresh from restoration to be judged.

One of the fresh restorations was presented by Sunflower member Larry Burke. This would be the 3rd time Larry had shown his 1928 Indian 401 at Fremont for judging. The last time was in 2018 and since then the bike and Larry have undergone extensive rehabilitation. Last year Larry injured his shoulder and ended up having surgery to repair it and then extensive rehab to get it back in condition. Prior to the injury Larry had completely disassembled the bike. One of the issues from the last judging required work on the frame which then had to be repainted. An Indian side car would be added before the next judging. Larry also has a 1939 Indian Four which he decided to convert back to the original leaf spring front suspension during the same time frame. So, he had two beautiful Indians 4's scattered all over the place when health issues and a shoulder separation side lined him.



Larry and I are almost neighbors, it's about a 2-minute drive between houses and I am always willing to help on his wonderfully restored machines. He would get things lined up and I would go over and do the heavy lifting. Finally the 39 Four was back together and his attention turned to getting the 28

ready for Fremont. Last July Larry was ready for to help to put the engine back in the frame. Terry Sawyer and I supplied the lifting and got the 4-cylinder back in the frame, it was looking like a motorcycle again. After that Larry had many small tasks he could work at his own pace.

January, this year, the bike was running and it was time to change gears and work on attaching his restored 1928 Princess side car. Larry's small



shop was not going to be big enough, good friend Dick Chance has a great private shop at his business, Chance Rides Manufacturing. We were able to complete the sidecar installation and final preparations for the show in Dicks shop.



One week before the meet everything was looking good, nothing left but some paint touch up and polishing. Larry made arrangements for a U-Haul trailer since he did not have an enclosed trailer of his own. Two days before the meet he picked up the trailer and we went to load the bike. Then there was major problem.





The bike and sidecar would not fit in the trailer. It was wide enough inside, but the door frame was too narrow to wiggle the bike through. Larry was completely dejected, his plans to get the bike to Fremont seemed ruined. He returned to the rental shop, but they didn't have anything that would work, and he was even considering taking the sidecar off so it would fit. There were several options for hauling it on an open trailer and the weather forecast was good. It was getting late and when Larry dropped me off at home, he said he didn't know what he was going to do. Later that evening he called and told me he talked with Kelly Modlin and he offered his trailer which was big enough.

Early the next morning Larry and I picked up the trailer, got the bike loaded and we were on the way to Fremont. Sunflower members Jeff Roth and Terry Sawyer were about an hour ahead of us. The drive was going good except for Larry's gas mileage, Kelly's big trailer drove down the fuel range to 180 miles per tank. We arrived in the afternoon with plenty of time to get unloaded and for Larry to get the Indian checked in. Thursday of the meet is for vendors to set up and registration of bikes for the show, but everyone makes a tour of the tables to see old friends and deal on the merchandise. After making the rounds



we headed to the hotel. We checked in, then went for supper and had a great steak dinner, at J's Steakhouse.

Friday at the meet, we spent the day checking out treasures on the vendor tables, visiting with AMCA members and admiring bikes. Jeff Roth had brought his recently completed Indian Six, it was looking great and was attracting a lot of spectators. The afternoon wore on, Larry had wiped down the 28 four-cylinder so many times the paint was starting to get thin. Five o'clock arrived and it was time for the traditional banquet which the Omaha Chapter hosts in the same building.

Saturday morning the judges start looking over the bikes. They are not judged against each other but scored against the standard that they were originally built. Larry was hovering around the judges answering questions, but looked as nervous as a hooker in church. With judging completed the judges convene in a separate room to tally the scores, everyone starts with 100 points and deductions are made for non-conformities. After entering in subsequent events, a bike progresses from Junior to Senior and finally to the Winners Circle.



I imagine it seemed like an eternity to Larry, but finally his judging was announced, 99 ¼ points, and this being the third time judged, the bike was promoted to the Winners Circle.







Jeffs Indian Six was not entered in a class for judging but was awarded the People's Choice award and the Most Unique award.

It was a beautiful day outside and we were loaded up and on the way home in no time at all. Consistent with Kansas typical weather we were soon headed into afternoon sun and a howling south wind. It didn't seem to be bothering Larry too much, he was still basking in the glory of his accomplishment.

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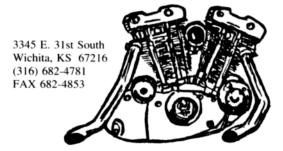
