

September is usually great weather and apparently that is why there were four Road Runs during the month. Early this year I was thinking that we would attend two events in the west, the Evergreen Chapter and Fort Sutter Road Runs. With the price of diesel fuel rising above \$5 a gallon, a 4000 mile plus trip was making me consider something closer to home. The Driftless Chapter Road Run in La Crosse Wisconsin would take us back to meet with friends from four years earlier.

The event started immediately after Labor Day. Robbie and I left home the week before and took a leisurely route through Missouri, Iowa, and Illinois before arriving in La Crosse. During check-in at the hotel, we received unexpected notice that they did not accept pets, unless they were service animals. This was totally unexpected since we had stayed at the hotel for the same event four years prior, with the same dog Cosmo, and our deceased dog Tux. I told them I was at fault for not asking about the pet policy and assuming it would be unchanged, so I would have to cancel our 5-night stay. Their last Road Run was preceded by torrential rains and they spent the night before each ride rerouting around closed roads and making new maps. The first days ride was across the Mississippi River and down the Minnesota side of the valley through beautiful farmlands. We had gone about 30 miles and pulled over with the group at Brownsville Overlook. After a short stop, the first bike to balk was Kelly's Harley. It diagnosed as a weak battery and



would not start. After contact with the chase truck the rest of the group rode on to New Albin, stopping for gas. It was there that the second bike was in need of help. Gary's Gold Wing would not idle, requiring 2000 rpm or more to keep running. Another call to the chase truck found that Kelly and Ellen were still stranded at the overlook. Seems the truck had battery problems too. Eventually the truck showed up to pick up Gary and Mary, they then found out there was no room on the trailer. They ended up getting taken

back to La Crosse and Gary retrieved his bike with his own trailer. The three remaining bikes in our group made the rest of the day without incident.

Previous Driftless president Paul Wuensch had asked if Robbie would like to ride around with his wife Michelle. So the first two days Robbie rode around with Michelle in her white 1965 Impala convertible, they had gotten acquainted at the previous Road Run. They were



quickly tagged as Thelma and Louise.



Day 2 started with a ride up Grandads Bluff and a fantastic view of La Crosse and the Mississippi River Valley. Then more great roads winding through the Wisconsin hills, followed by lunch at the Hillsboro Brewery. This beautiful facility is a restored canned milk factory. Great lunch and cold brews. The return ride to the hotel was more sunny farm country.







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

Planning the Fall Ride started a several months ago when I ran across a map of a ride from 2014 when the Cannonball came through Kansas and stopped in Junction City. Members of the Chapter met in Junction City to greet the Sunflower riders when they arrived on that Friday afternoon. Then on Saturday we took a ride through the Flint Hills. I liked that route and planned on following it exactly as we did in 2014. After making some phone calls to verify hotel and restaurant reservations, I took a ride about one month prior to verify the roads.

I left Wichita early one beautiful morning and headed to Junction City. My first mission was to check out the roads for a Friday evening supper ride. This ride followed roads we used in our 2016 National Road Run. The ride starts with the J Hill Road which takes you along the high bluff that looks down at Junction City and the Smoky Hill River Valley. J Hill continues on as Lyons Creek Road and then on to Wolf Road, this is one of my favorite stretches in the Flint Hills. From there I road west and north on county highways and arrived in Chapman. In Chapman I went to the La Hacienda Taqueria restaurant that I had contacted about supper. Unfortunately the restaurant was closed for a week, but it looked like it would be fine for our supper ride.

I made my way back to Junction City and started the Saturday route on highway KS 57 towards Dwight. This is where I encountered first signs of trouble, detour signs for highways KS 77 and KS 4 as I turned onto KS57. I continued as planned, thinking I could find a way around whatever the issue was. It was not long before I came to the reason for the detour. There is a major project improving KS 77 with a huge traffic circle excavation in the middle where I wanted to go. I ended up taking 3 miles of gravel road to get around and back onto my planned route. The rest of the route into Manhattan and then onto Wamego did not have any issues. I doubled back looking for an alternative that did not involve gravel roads. I spent the afternoon riding around looking for something that would work and decided to work on it at home. It was a long day by the time I got home, my planned check ride of about 300 miles had turned into 420.

The Sunflower Fall Ride this year had a regional flavor to it. The Sunflower members welcomed the Omaha Chapter, and Santa Fe Chapter. All total there were 26 people from Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, and even New Mexico. Folks started arriving Friday afternoon, September 23<sup>rd</sup>, and by 5pm we had 13 bikes riding to dinner at La Hacienda Taqueria. It was a beautiful evening ride at sunset, with good Mexican food, and special friends including Caroline Kline from Santa Fe New Mexico, who had ridden all the way on her Harley trike. In 2018 Caroline had ridden all the way to Clinton Missouri for a Sunflower weekend. The ride back to the hotel was cool and while we were gone the Omaha Chapter had arrived.

Outside Alta Vista we had to navigate some construction before returning to Junction City via Humboldt Creek Road. It had been a beautiful day on some of the best roads in the Flint Hills. We wrapped up with dinner at Tyme Out steak house on the outskirts of town.

Sunday morning several people wanted to get in a short ride before calling it quits. The rest of us said our goodbyes and headed home. Thanks to all who came and made it a memorable weekend.





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
